CREDENTIAL POLICY

The Famous Idaho Potato Bowl credential policy is designed to best allocate credentials in order to maximize coverage in a safe, professional working environment. Unfortunately, it is not possible to accommodate all requests.

Preference will be given to media who cover all home and away games of the Mountain West and Pac-12 teams playing in this year's game, as well as Idaho media who routinely cover events on the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl's year-long calendar.

Media that cover only home games of either of the two schools will receive next priority. As a general rule, if either school hasn't granted credentials to a media outlet for multiple games during the regular season, they will not be granted credentials for the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl.

MEDIA GUIDELINES

Credentials can be picked up in the Allen Noble Hall of Fame at the southwest corner of Albertsons Stadium Sunday, Dec. 21, from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m. Credentials will be available on gameday at Media Will Call, located at the ticket office on the west side of Albertsons Stadium. To arrange a different pickup time, please contact Craig Lawson (509) 432-9063.

Postgame Press Conferences

Postgame press conferences will take place in the Allen Noble Hall of Fame, following the on-field trophy presentation. The losing team will go first, followed by the winning team. Each school will be represented by its head coach and select student-athletes. After the two press conferences, media may request additional interviews through each school's media relations staff.

Press Box in Albertsons Stadium

The west side is the location of the Paul J. Schneider Press Box on the sixth floor of the Stueckle Sky Center. The elevator in the North Tower and is marked #5. You must have your press pass before entering the elevator. A meal will be served for the media on game day on the sixth floor - Media Level. (Passes are available for pick up at the Allen Noble Hall of Fame Gallery on Sunday, Dec. 21 and at Media Will Call on Monday, Dec. 22.

Sidelines

Photographers are reminded to not shoot inside the team bench areas. Stadium passes are nontransferable. No children under the age of 14 are allowed on the sidelines for the safety of the fans and participants. No live video transmission is allowed from inside the stadium on game day.

Northern Illinois utilized multiple trick plays and a stingy second-half defense to outlast Fresno State in a 28-20 double overtime victory, the second FIPB all-time that needed extra periods. The teams traded touchdowns in the first overtime period, then NIU scored on a double pass, with George Dimopoulos completing the 25-yard touchdown to Dane Pardridge. The two-point conversion was successful, as Dimopoulos completed another pass, this time to NIU quarterback and FIPB MVP Josh Holst. Jordan Hansen clinched the win with a fourth down sack of Fresno State quarterback Joshua Wood. Fresno State was on the board first, capitalizing on a Jayden Davis interception on NIU's first play from scrimmage. Bryson Donaldson punched in a 1-yard touchdown rush. The Huskies answered with a 16-play, 63-yard drive, culminating in a 29-yard field goal from Kanon Woodill. The Bulldogs scored again on their next drive, with Joshua Wood scrambling in for a 13-yard touchdown. Fresno State's defense bent but did not break, holding NIU scoreless on a 20-play, 85-yard drive that lasted nearly 12 minutes, taking a 13-3 lead into the half. NIU took control in the second half, with Grayson Barnes making a spectacular one-handed catch for a 26-yard touchdown on the first possession of the third quarter. The Huskies intercepted Wood on the ensuing possession before Woodill tied the game at 13 with a 34-yard field goal. That score held for the remainder of regulation, as FSU's Dylan Lynch missed a potential game-winning field goal as time expired, his third miss of the day. Wood threw a 9-yard touchdown to Donaldson in the first overtime before NIU matched it with a 3-yard strike to Barnes.

Georgia State quarterback Darren Grainger's threw for three touchdowns and rushed for two more to defeat Utah State. Grainger's five total touchdowns tied a FIPB record for most touchdowns responsible for. He finished with 257 yards passing while completing 19 of his 22 passing attempts, the second-best completion percentage in FIPB history (86.4%). He added 111 yards rushing and was unanimously named the game's MVP. Panther running back Freddie Brock set a Georgia State record with 276 yards rushing. Brock and Grainger became the fourth duo in FIPB history to record over 100 yards rushing each. Georgia State started the scoring in the first quarter when Grainger scored on a 1-yard rushing touchdown with 7:36 on the clock. Utah State responded on the ensuing possession with a 45-yard touchdown strike from Levi Williams to Jalen Royals. Grainger scored his second rushing touchdown, finding the end zone with another 1-yard rush with 3:57 left in the opening period. The lead was short-lived, as the Aggies tied the game again 16 seconds later on a Davon Booth 65-yard touchdown rush. Tailique Williams secured a 27-yard reception for Georgia State with 15 seconds left in the quarter to take a 21-14 lead, marking the highest scoring opening quarter in FIPB history. The Panthers created some distance with a 31-yard field goal from Liam Rickman in the second quarter. Granger threw his second touchdown pass of the day, a 23-yard pass to Cadarius Thompson with 1:17 left in the half, to give Georgia State a 31-14 lead into the locker room. Thompson caught his second touchdown of the day midway through the third quarter and Brock delivered the knockout punch with 9:18 left in the final frame, running the ball into the end zone from five yards out. Utah State scored the final points of the day, scoring on a 2-yard touchdown pass from McCae Hillstead to Terrell Vaughn.

2022: Dec. 20, 2022 – Eastern Michigan 41, San Jose State 27

Eastern Michigan erased an early 13-point deficit, scoring a quartet of touchdowns in the first half, en route to defeating San Jose State 41-27. The Eagles spotted the Spartans a 13-0 lead and then ripped off 33-straight points to build a 20-point advantage in the third quarter. Following San Jose State's second first-quarter touchdown, EMU's Sterling Miles blocked the Spartans' PAT and Tristan Hines returned the ball 87 yards for two points. Down 13-2, the Eagles engineered four touchdown drives before intermission, including a bowl-record 96-yard march that spanned 13 plays and concluded with a 1-yard pass from Taylor Powell to Taylor Lassiter. Two of EMU's scoring series were set up via an interception. Samson Evans punched in a pair of touchdowns on the ground in the opening half. San Jose State's Chevan Cordeiro finished 26-of-44 for 366 yards and three scores. He added a rushing touchdown as well.

Wyoming quarterback Levi Williams rushed for 200 yards and four touchdowns and the Cowboys defeated Kent State 52-38. Williams tied FIPB records for touchdowns rushing and touchdowns responsible for (five) as he added a touchdown pass. His 200 yards on the ground are fourth most in FIPB history and tied for fifth by a quarterback in any bowl game. He was named the game's Most Valuable Player. Kent State set an FIPB record with 656 total yards. Marquez Cooper (125 yards) and Bryan Bradford (109) each eclipsed the century mark on the ground while Cephas (116 yards on fourth catches) and Nykeim Johnson (seven receptions for 101 yards) each had 100-yard receiving games. The teams combined for 723 yards rushing, sixth most all-time in a bowl game. Wyoming trailed 17-7 in the second quarter when Williams dashed 50 yards for a score and connected on a 42-yard passing touchdown to take the lead. Kent State went back on top with just 24 seconds left before halftime. The Cowboys took command in the third quarter as Williams and Xavian Valladay each scored on the ground. Williams delivered the knockout punch with an 80-yard jaunt at 12:49 of the fourth quarter.

Nevada quarterback Carson Strong matched a Famous Idaho Potato Bowl record with five touchdown passes to cap his Mountain West Offensive MVP season and lead Nevada past Tulane, 38-27. Strong tossed three scores in the first 18 minutes as the Wolf Pack claimed a 19-0 lead and never looked back. The Wolf Pack led 26-7 at halftime, but Tulane outscored Nevada 13-0 in the third quarter to make it a one-score game. An interception gave the ball back to Strong, who took advantage three plays later, connecting with tight end Cole Turner for the second time in the game. Boise, Idaho's Capital City, offers a rare blend of urban amenities and hometown comfort with interesting and unique sites and attractions, inviting outdoors, unlimited recreation, diverse cultural offerings and a family-friendly atmosphere .

Situated in Southwest Idaho at the foot of the scenic Boise Front, Boise is home to several Fortune 500 companies with national and international headquarters or divisions, sprawling high-tech campuses, Boise State University and other college satellite campuses and regional medical centers . Boise has a population of approximately 225,000, with over 700,000 in the metropolitan area . Considered one of the nation's most remote urban areas, Boise is 336 miles from Salt Lake City and 431 miles from Portland, its closest metropolitan neighbors.

A city that enjoys its easily accessible outdoors, the City of Trees offers a pleasant contrast of mountains meeting desert. The high-desert climate and warmth of the Snake River valley translates to a mild winter -- low humidity, minimal rainfall and an average of only 19 inches of snow annually. Summer visitors enjoy the same low humidity and rainfall numbers with warmer temperatures. The long summer days, with daylight lasting until after 9:30 p.m., allow plenty of time for outdoor recreation .

Whether a local or visitor, while in Boise for the game, plan to enjoy the city to its fullest. And make sure to include Bogus Basin Mountain Recreation Area in your itinerary. Bogus Basin is located just 16 miles north of Boise's city center. It is the perfect, affordable winter activity for all ages. Bogus offers 2,600 acres of skiable terrain including nordic skiing on 37 km of groomed trails with 3.8 km of solar-lit trails; day and night downhill skiing and snowboarding on 53 groomed runs with an 1,800 ft vertical drop; three graduated-level terrain parks; and the Pepsi GoldRush Tubing Hill. There are three lodges on the mountain. Childcare, rentals and lessons are available. Visitors staying at Boise hotels may take advantage of a special "Buy One alpine or nordic ticket and Get One Free" promotion. Ask the front desk staff at your hotel for more information.

While fun in the snow is quite popular, there are several "must see" attractions and activities in the Boise area. Stroll along the Basque Block – on Grove Street between Capitol Blvd and 6th Street - for a taste of the colorful Basque culture. Visit the Basque Museum and Boarding House for an interpretation of Boise's Basque heritage. Try some Basque food and drink at Germika or Leku Ona or shop for Basque food and wine specialties at the Basque Market .

Just east of downtown is the Old Idaho Territorial Penitentiary, one of four territorial prisons still in existence in the U.S. A recent subject of the Travel Channel's "Ghost Adventures" show, the Old Pen housed many Wild West desperadoes in its time. Built in 1870, it closed in 1973 following prisoner riots over living conditions. The imposing sandstone compound includes a

self-guided walking tour, transportation museum and the nation's largest collections of historic arms and military memorabilia. The Old Pen is flanked by the Idaho Botanical Garden which is lit for the holidays with over 550,000 sparkling lights. Be dazzled by the spectacular display of color and light in the Garden - artistically arranged and beautifully designed. Enjoy hot refreshments, cookies and roaring bonfires while you revel in the holiday atmosphere.

Other outdoor interests located along the Boise River and connected by the Greenbelt include the Idaho Anne Frank Human Rights Memorial near downtown and the M.K. Nature Center. The Memorial is an example of what can happen when a community and an entire state come together for a cause. The first in the United States to honor Anne Frank, the Idaho Anne Frank Human Rights Memorial offers a lesson on courage, strength, dignity of human spirit and the value of human rights for all men and women.

The M.K. Nature Center offers a one-of-a-kind fish and wildlife experience on a 4.6-acre site. The Nature Center's outdoor nature walk and indoor visitor center provide a glimpse of Idaho's many landscapes and abundant wildlife through hands-on exhibits. Underwater viewing windows along the stream walk give visitors a "fish-eye" view of the world. The Center is open from dawn to dusk and is a favorite among local and visiting families.

Back indoors at the World Center for Birds of Prey, visitors can see rare falcons and eagles up close and the inner workings of an endangered species program. This unique center on the outskirts of Boise is the most sophisticated facility in the world for breeding and releasing birds of prey. Interactive exhibits, hands-on displays and live birds make this a wonderful attraction. There are many more interesting attractions in the area including the Idaho Black History Museum, Idaho Historical Museum, Boise Art Museum, Zoo Boise and the Discovery Center of Idaho – a hands-on science museum – all located in Julia Davis Park.

If shopping and dining are favorite pastimes, you are sure to find your fill. Downtown is jam-packed with boutiques, art galleries and restaurants. The downtown streets, BoDo, the Linen District and nearby Hyde Park are home to numerous shops and boutiques selling casual and formal attire, decorative house wares, outdoor apparel, antiques, imported goods and much, much more. Boise also offers a regional shopping mall, while Meridian is home to the valley's newest mall, the Village. More than 144 restaurants, coffee shops, brewpubs and cafés, many with cozy patios, line the streets of downtown, the perfect spot to relax or enjoy a meal with friends. Enjoy late nights? Many clubs and bars feature live bands and entertainment.

For those wishing to experience scenic beauty and more winter recreation, drive three hours to the northeast to the resort town of Sun Valley – home of the nation's first commercial ski resort. The quaint town of McCall on beautiful Payette Lake and near Brundage Mountain Ski Resort, and the place where many Boiseans go to get away, is 2.5 hours north on Hwy 55.



ALBERTSONS STADIUM

Albertsons Stadium is the home of Boise State University football and the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl. The venue opened in 1970 with 14,500 seats at a cost of \$2.2 million. In 1974, the east side upper deck was added, increasing the seating capacity to 20,000. Portable end zone seating had the capacity of the stadium at 22,600 through the 1996 season.

The stadium was expanded to 30,000 seats prior to the start of the 1997 football season. Included in the \$10 million project was the additional seating in the southwest and southeast corners, construction of the Allen Noble Hall of Fame Gallery and completion of the Larry and Marianne Williams Plaza.

In 2008, Stueckle Sky Center opened and the capacity increased to 32,000. The four-level facility includes logo boxes, club seating, sky suites and gameday media operations for Boise State home football games. Additionally, five individual banquet style or meeting room spaces are located throughout the 131,000-square-foot facility.

Temporary mobile seating was added in the north and south end zones prior to the 2009 campaign and 3,500 permanent seats were added to the area in summer 2012. The current seating capacity is 36,363.

Boise State established a first in 1986 by installing blue AstroTurf as its playing surface. The second blue AstroTurf was installed in 1995 and a third prior to the 2002 season. A blue FieldTurf surface was installed in 2008. It was replaced in 2010 and again in 2019. Other schools had special color projects in the end zone area prior to the Broncos, but Boise State was the first to have the entire field produced in a special color. There were two green AstroTurf fields installed prior to 1986. The first was during the original construction of the current stadium in 1970, with the second installed prior to the 1978 season.
